

The Unpeeled Mango: A Qualitative Assessment of Views and Preferences concerning Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision in Iringa Region, Tanzania

This document describes the findings of a qualitative assessment conducted in three districts of Tanzania's Iringa Region to guide the implementation of a voluntary medical male circumcision programme for HIV prevention. Evaluation of the Informed Consent Process for Male Circumcision Scale-up in Zambia

This report describes the findings of an assessment conducted by the Population Council from December 2009 to March 2010, when the Male Circumcision Partnership began scaling up male circumcision services in Zambia. It provides recommendations for improving the way clients and others are informed about the risks and benefits of the procedure.
